



Then and Now: *Hā'uki* (Sports)

In old Hawai'i, sports were played for leisure and to build speed and strength in warriors. During the annual makahiki festival, a four-month long New Year celebration that began in late autumn and continued through the winter months, Native Hawaiians engaged in a number of sporting activities, from the daring he'e holua (lava sledding) to the difficult 'ulu maika (rolling disks).

Today, ancient Hawaiian sports are perpetuated in Hawai'i and throughout the world, as a new generation practices beloved pastimes such as outrigger canoe paddling and surfing. Hawai'i's tropical weather also makes it the perfect destination for world-class sports events, including the Hawaiian Airlines Diamond Head Classic, Quiksilver in Memory of Eddie Aikau, and the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl.

In this Winter edition of the Festivals of Hawai'i calendar, you will discover more than 40 festivals and events throughout the island chain that celebrate the best of Hawai'i's historical and contemporary culture in addition to sports, including dance, music, arts and crafts, agriculture, food and more.

It is the only big-wave specialty event sanctioned by the Association of Surfing Professionals (ASP), and happens only when “the bay calls the day.” If the waves hit 20 feet or higher, then an elite group of invited surfers will take to the death-defying walls of water.
